(Remember- a phrase does NOT contain a verb (process) and begins with a preposition – in, to, at, near, about, with, for, through, by, on, of, around, beside, beneath, before) Adjectival phrases add meaning to the nouns (participants) immediately before them. Adjectival phrases – say how much, how many, what kind and point out!
